

# Regarding Storm Theophany Imagery in the Psalms

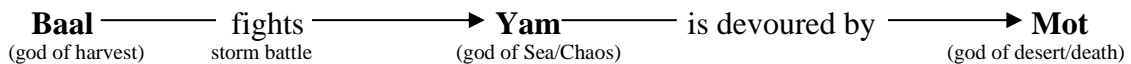
## Ancient Canaanites Mythology

Rains provide Life in the Desert

**Baal** – god of rain (therefore, god of harvest, life & fertility)  
(manifested in lightning/thunder/shaking of the earth)

**Yam** – god of the sea/abyss (therefore, god of darkness & chaos)  
(manifested in leviathan/sea serpent *Rahab/Lotan*)

**Mot** – god of desert (therefore, god of death)



- Storm comes over the sea who fights to keep it back – Yam fights Baal
- Storm comes ashore and provides the rain – Baal is declared king.
- Banquet is declared – Spring harvest
- Storm is swallowed by the desert as it moves further eastward – Mot swallows Baal  
(Cycle repeats itself in a cyclical view of the cosmos)  
*See also 1 Kgs 17-18 – Elijah preaches against the cult of Baal*

## Yahweh replaces Canaanite gods after occupation of the Promised Land



- Yahweh rides in on the clouds (See Psalms 18 & 29).
- Conquers the sea bringing order to chaos
- Banquet is declared celebrating victory over enemies – See Isa 25:6-9
- Yahweh, unlike Baal, swallows death – is not swallowed by death.  
(Early apocalyptic prophecy portrays God’s ultimate victory over death; no cyclical pattern – See Isa 25:8)

## Psalm #18 – Panel I (vv. 5-20) vs. Panel II (vv. 30, 33-46)

- 1<sup>st</sup> { I – Generic description of enemies; action and description is very connected  
II – No identification of enemies
- 2<sup>nd</sup> { I – Threatened by an enemy; more powerful enemy; agent of death  
II – the enemy is fleeing; no longer intimidating
- 3<sup>rd</sup> { I – God listens and Saves  
II – v. 42 Enemies cry to the Lord, not to their gods, but to YHWH.  
The Lord does not save them, will not listen.
- 4<sup>th</sup> { I – Enemy is the aggressor; David is the object of persecution  
II – David takes the initiative toward the enemy
- 5<sup>th</sup> { I – God is described audaciously – subliminal glimpses; behind a cloud, veiled  
II – Conventional description of God – shield, right hand, etc.
